

Animal Stories

In chosing these animal stories our criteria were that the animals must be central to the story and must behave like animals. There are many stories centring on animals in which the animals habitually behave like people, for example Brian Jacques' popular Redwall series and the perennially popular Wind in the Willows, and these have not been included.

Some stories might be properly categorised as animal fantasy in that the animals talk to each other and co-operate with or attempt to deceive each other. However they act as animals in that they live in places wild animals would live, eat the food wild animals would eat and are threatened by the dangers that animals rather than people would encounter. There may be many other titles which could be included but these are some of our favourites.

London: Viking 1986.

"There was once a boy who turned into a dog". This arresting first sentence recounts how 10-year-old Eric became a Norfolk terrier. A hilarious book which sees life from a dog's point-of-view and, yes, Eric does resume his human shape-eventually!

Panda in thePark.

London: Hodder Headline 1999. This is one of the enormously successful Animal Ark series, all of them ideal reading for 7- 10 - year -olds. Here Mandy and James are with their conservation officer mother in China when an endangered panda cub escapes from a research park. Can they find

it to reunite it with its mother?

Julie of the Wolves

London: Hamish Hamilton 1973. This classic story describes how Inuit Julie tries to make her way across Alaska. When she is lost she realizes that her only hope of survival is to become adopted by a wolf pack. A wonderful picture of the social life of wolves but with added human interest. Ages 12+.

King-Smith, Dick.

The Sheep Pig.

The book from which the film Babe was made. King-Smith's animals are always unusual but stay within the bounds of their own species. Here a young pig, raised by a farm dog, wants to herd sheep like his foster mother... Funny, warm and memorable for ages 8-12.

Martin's Mice.

Another unusual animal. Martin is a farm kitten who does not want to eat mice. He rather likes them and this leads to all sorts of amusing complications. For ages 8-12.

Happy Mouseday.

London: Doubleday 1994.

For Beginner readers. Pete wants a pet mouse but his parents say "NO!" how can he achieve his ambition?

Horse Pie

London: Doubleday 1993.

Captain, Ladybird and Herbert are Shire horses and a Suffolk Punch. They are not pleased when Jenny, a retired seaside donkey, joins them in the paddock. But they find that even a donkey can be useful... large print, suitable for 7-9s.

All Because of Jackson

London: Doubleday 1995.

Rabbits became a plague in Australia, all because of Jackson, a pioneering rabbit who managed to smuggle himself and a lady friend onto a sailing ship in 1842. Easy reading for 7-9s.

Godhanger

London: Doubleday 1996.

A much darker book than King-Smith's usually humorous ones and for a much older age group. The great tyrant of Godhanger Wood is the gamekeeper. The animals there need protection and this arrives in the form of a huge and mysterious bird. The book is an allegory about sacrifice and redemption. Poetically and memorably written it is arguably King-Smith's finest work. For 13+.

Morpurgo, Michael

The Nine Lives of Montezuma

Surrey: Kaye & Ward 1980, Mammoth 1992.

Montezuma is a farm cat and this absorbing account of his life takes him from birth to death. 8-12 years.

War Horse

Surrey: Kaye & Ward 1982, Mammoth 1990.

A rare book about World War I seen through the eyes of Joey, a farm horse taken to the Western Front. Morpurgo reveals both the heroism and the futility of war. 10-13.

Little Foxes

Surrey: Kaye & Ward 1984, Mammoth 1990.

A lonely boy discovers a ruined church taken over by wild animals including a family of foxes. 8-12.

Oldfield, Jenny

Scruffy the Scamp


London: Hodder Headline 1997. This is one in a series of books about the Home Farm Twins who cannot resist animals. The scruffy Scamp is one among many. Very readable, large print, the series is much loved by 7-10 year olds.


The Animal Alert Books.

London:Doubleday 1995.

Rowan's father accidentally hits a pony when driving at night. Rowan persuades her parents to let her keep it, but "Swallow" as she names him, is wild and high-spirited. Can she tame him for Pony Club outings? The result is seen in-

The Swallow Summer. London: Doubleday 1996.

These books are 'must reads' for horse-crazy girls and others who would like a horse but do not have one!

Potter, Beatrix

The Tale of Peter Rabbit; The Tale of Tom Kitten; The Tale of Jemima Puddleduck etc

London: Frederick Warne & Co. Ltd.

Although Beatrix Potter sometimes criticised for clothing her animals they do nevertheless behave as animals. She does not fudge the precarious existence that many animals have - Peter Rabbit is nearly put in a pie, Jemima Puddleduck only just escapes being a fox's dinner. Potter always wanted to keep her books small enough for a child to hold in its hand, and these small books are ideal for reading one-to-one. There are now larger editions suitable for class reading. Potter is never condescending, her language is extending but the meaning is always clear from the context. Ages 3-6.

Sheldon, Dyan and Blythe, Gary

The Whales' Song

London: Hutchinson 1990,

A beautiful and poetic picture book in which a small girl learns the story of whales and is finally rewarded. Ages 5-7.

Thomas, Frances and Brown, Ruth

Mr. Bear and the Bear

London: Andersen Press 1996.

The story of a dancing bear who became adopted by the eccentric Mr. Bear. Superb pictures in a book specially written to draw attention to the plight of bears worldwide. Ages 6-9.

BraveLion, Scared Lion Scholastic 1997.

Jake, the brave lion cub, shows off but his brother Jasper is timid. Their mothers warn them to stay away from the river where they meet a crocodile. A delightful tale with colourful illustrations.

Carle, Eric

The Bad-Tempered Ladybird Puffin 2000.

A bad-tempered ladybird picks fights with every animal it meets, but soon learns the importance of friends. A humorous story in which Carle explores the concepts of size and time through brightly coloured pictures. Ages 3-6.

The Very Hungry Caterpillar. Puffin 1970.

This classic is a much loved story. There are lots of holes for little fingers to explore. An interactive book about numbers, days of the week and time. Ages 3-6.

Dodd, Lynley


Hairy Maclary from Donaldson's Dairy

Toad Rage Puffin 2000.

Limpy is a cane toad who cannot accept that humans hate him and his kind and embarks on a journey across Australia to try and change the minds of the whole human race. 9+

Kipling, Rudyard

The Jungle Book

First published 1894. Puffin 1994. The first of the two Jungle Books includes the well-known story of Mowgli, a man cub adopted by a family of wolves and Rikki-tikkitavi the mongoose who saves the life of a child by killing a snake. Unlike Walt Disney's light-hearted depiction of Mowgli's story his animal guardians are true to their natures, and the law of the jungle is kill or be killed.

A good story to read aloud to 8+.

Toronto: Harper Collins 1997, London: Hodder Silver 1999.




Paiba, Helen, editor

The illustrations are cartoon-like, and the use of speech bubbles in conjunction with the text would help a beginner reader of chapter books. 6-8 years

Orchard Books, 1997.

Robertson, the cat, loves to be petted and adored. He also loves catching birds. The more birds he catches, however, the less fuss he receives. He has a hard lesson to learn about how to earn back the


Jess, the Border Collie series

AGM UPDATE

At the AGM the following motions were passed clearing the way for the proposed merger of the Children's Literature Association with the Children's Book Foundation.

- 1. That this AGM of the CLA amend Clause 13 of the constitution to read as follows:
- "In the event of the Society being wound up, the surplus assets after payment of the Society's liabilities and the expenses of the winding up shall be paid to a charitable organisaion with similar aims and objectives."
- 2. That this AGM of the CLA endorses in principle the intention to form a new Society to be known as the Children's Literature Foundation of New Zealand Inc.
- 3. That this AGM agrees to the proposed merger of the CLA into the Society to be known as the Children's Literature Foundation of NZ Inc.

Our guest speaker was Christine Dale, Publishing Manager of Scholastic New Zealand, who gave a very interesting and informative Power Point presentation entitled "Polishing the Diamond" diamonds being the manuscripts submitted to Scholastic publication.
