

Flashing Fire Engines and Terrific Trains. (Kingfisher). FP


Little Baa


In the Beginning

The Riddle of the Frozen Phantom



The Christmas Rat



A well written and well paced story for both girls and boys 11 – 13. CA



The tales are fascinating (even I could not decide) and quite ingenuous in the way each pulls the reader into the text. Archie's choice of winner was inspirational. Give this book to any child and ask them to act as judge. WM

Jacob lives with, Sarah, his
grandmother. She's never
remarried after the death of her
husband during the Battle of
Arnhem. Jacob, who is named
after his grandfather, has been
asked to attend the fiftieth
anniversary of the battle in place
of Sarah.

In Holland Jacob meets the woman who befriended his grandfather, Geertrui Wesseling, during the war. Geertrui is dying of cancer but there is also another cancer eating away at the characters- one of an unspoken truth.

This novel is multi-layered and

intertextual. Many thorny issues are discussed for example euthanasia, bisexuality. Thus making it appropriate for secondary school readers This book won the Carnegie Medal in 2000. WM
