

but this comfortable pairing of writer and illustrator make this book a delight. Toddlers will love this. FP








Dashing Dog

Pet Day is a feature for many rural New Zealand children. In this book, Sam's school prepare for, and enjoy, their Pet Day. Many children and their various pets – including ants – are introduced. The day is followed by the local A & P (Agricultural & Pastoral) Show. Lavishly illustrated by colour photographs, this is a must have for an insight into an aspect of New Zealand life. Foster Dog

The story of Grandad and Molly was based on Joy's own dog, Coda. When Grandad's dog, Molly, dies Grandad's upset and lonely, but doesn't want a new dog. Instead his family ask him to foster a dog for them, until they have a big enough house. At a visit to the SPCA Grandad chooses Foster. But what will happen they find they're new big house? Read and Wonder Series Published by Walker Books

This wonderful series of natural history books has particular appeal with the enthusiastic and beautiful writing styles by such authors as Vivian French, Dick King-Smith, Karen Wallace, Nicola Davies and Martin Jenkins.

Each author has their own distinctive style but the author that really appealed to me is Martin Jenkins with his chatty, enthusiasm for the animals he is writing about. Although all these books are non-fiction they are written as picture books and have extra fact lines in a different font placed creatively on the page.

And because he's egg-sitting, he can't go off to the sea to feed. Her family all give her farm related presents for her birthday and Christmas, including a tractor with a trailer and a model farmyard with lots of animals. But the thing Sophie wants most is a pet of her own. When she finds a large black cat sitting on the wall she decides to look after him and calls him 'Tom'. Under Sophie's care Tom becomes more friendly and a lot fatter, and fatter...until one morning when Sophie discovers that 'Tom'has had kittens! Suitable for 4-8 year olds.

The truth about Toffee

Janet Slater Bottin illustrated by Alice Bell Scholastic, 2003 Pb, ISBN 1869435508 This delightful little story is told through the letters, emails and photos sent by Skye to her Grandmother. Skye is very distressed to learn that her favourite horse, Toffee, is to sold and replaced by a stronger and vounger horse. By following the guidance of her Grandmother Skye learns that she can make a difference in her community. Though there are hints within the

emails, It is not until later in the story the reader learns just how important this lesson has been for Skye.


Three books in one, this is part of a popular easy read collection by Colin West. Monty the dog has many funny adventures because he is short sighted and accident prone. (The glasses only help the short sighted problem!) The book is set out as a chapter book, and would be very useful for children moving on from school readers. It is liberally sprinkled with black and white illustrations. Ages 6 and up. LH



Horse Stories that Really Happened

A collection of six stories featuring real horses doing horse things. There's the story of Bucephalus and Alexander the Great; the rescue of Savanna – a horse who almost didn't survive; and Foinavon's running of the Grand National. In between each story are facts about horses. A great collection to read aloud, or to give the horse fan. Note: this title is not in print, but should be available from most libraries. Ages 7 and over. AC.



Animal Stories that Really Happened

A collection of stories featuring various animals. Included is the story of Faith, the Vicar's cat, who survived a bombing attack on the vicarage; Old Dog who saved his owner; and the story behind Marguerite Henry's book *Misty of Chincoteague*. There's also facts and snippets of other stories, making this perfect for the animal fan. Note: this title is not in print, but should be available from most libraries. Ages 7 and over. AC.

This is a re-issue of the original book that led to the popular movie, Babe. Babe is the story of an orphan pig, brought up with a family of sheep dogs. Because of his environment, he too believes he is a dog, and confounds the farmer by rounding up the sheep. The book is very closely allied to the movie, and would be very suitable for reluctant readers, building on the familiar. Ages 8 and up. LH



White Wolf Henrietta Branford Walker 1999 Pb, ISBN 074456395X

This is the story of Snowy, a white wolf, told from his point of view. Snowy was captured by Jesse's father and kept to, eventually, protect them against Indian attack. Except the attack comes before Snowy has fully grown. His white fur is meaningful to the local Indian tribe and Jesse sacrifices his own freedom to save Snowy's life. Snowy becomes part of a pack and grows to have cubs of his own. An insight into wolf culture, with a historical flavour. Ages 8 and over. AC.



The Last Wolf Michael Morpurgo Corgi 2003 Pb, ISBN 0440865077

Morpurgo has drawn together many threads in this fictional speculation of the fate of the last wolf in Scotland. Young fleeing Jacobite, Robbie, cares for the cub of the last wolf and names him Charlie (after the Prince). Together they make their way to America and freedom, where both grow and become fathers. This deceptively simple historic tale is framed by a grandfather's interest genealogy. Foreman's illustrations are also deceptively simple, yet are atmospheric and emotional. 
The Nine Lives of Montezuma


War Horse Michael Morpurgo Egmont Books 2002 Pb, ISBN 0749748508

Twelve -year -old Emeline is stunned when she finds an injured seal pup. She is torn between two worlds, hers and her father's more practical one. He was part of a whaling crew. He needed to feed his family. Should she try to save the pup? This book is thought provoking, and evocative of life in early New Zealand. Suitable for ages 9 and up. LH

Greyfriars Bobby

A classic tale of animal devotion. Bobby, a Skye terrier, stays at his master's grave for 14 years supported by friends and the love of the children in the surrounding tenements. This original and unabridged edition may be difficult for the modern reader, with its heavy use of Scots English dialect. However, once you get past this, it's still a wonderful and touching read. Ages 10 and over. AC.

Harriet Huxtable & the Purpose of Rats

Harriet is devastated when her Boris, her pet tortoise, dies. Then she is doubly devastated to realise that the A+ project she was intending to base on Boris is now dead too. A Boy and His Bear



When Dickon protects a bear cub from cruelty at the London Bear Garden, a strong bond is forged between boy and animal. This bond however, arouses jealousy and superstition and puts both Dickon and the cub in danger. Helped by a group of tumblers, they flee into France, seeking freedom from captivity for the cub and freedom from his hated Tannery apprenticeship for Dickon.

Jackie French Angus & Robertson 2002 Pb, ISBN 0207198306 This is a fascinating collection of stories set in different times and places but centred on the special relationship between men and horses. The settings range from 6000 years ago in the Ukraine where a child rescues a foal whose mother has been killed for food, and which in turn saves her life, to ancient China where the inhabitants of a small village wall themselves up to escape the marauding army of Genghis Khan and move through to 19th and 20th Century Australia. Each story is an absorbing snapshot of its time and gives a different glimpse of the importance of horses to human society over the ages. 9+ HB

Browne Bloomsbury 2001 ISBN 0747555192 A curious juxtaposition begins this novel as the read is introduced to two storylines - one of the girl Karen, her body critically injured in hospital, and the other of Fox, a wild animal but with Karen's mind and memories. Two lives in parallel worlds, two fates but one spirit. Karen must decide to which world she can fully belong, because triumph in one world will mean death in the other. An excellent fantasy.
