




#### Mr McGee Goes to Sea

umbrella ensures that he doesn't remain trapped in its belly for long. Disgorged in a spout of water, his umbrella guides him downwards and helps in his safe return to his tree and tea. Age 2+ BF

Grandpa and his grandson Thomas visit the beach. Simple, yet effective descriptive text alternates with the 'swish, swash, swoosh, says the sea' refrain. The delight in each other's company is evident in the shared activities and the illustrations reflect this wonderfully. 2 + CA

Pb 0735813124 (2000) Sailor suited Little Rabbit and his toy boat are never parted. However, Little Rabbit has never seen the sea, so he asks family members who all describe the sea very differently. He asks a squawking seagull who tells him the sea is too far away. But one day the gull returns with a shell ... "inside this shell is the never ending sea". The illustrations in Bishop's distinctive style use muted tones of blue, green and gold and certainly capture the moods of the sea. 3 - 7 year olds will enjoy this story. CA



One Nighttime Sea Deborah Lee Rose III. Steve Jenkins Scholastic Press 2003 Hb ISBN 0439339065 Take a nocturnal tour of the ocean, counting some of the strange creatures of the sea, from beluga whales and basking otters to silky nudibranchs (sea slugs). Jenkins uses stunning paper collage to bring these creatures to life. The spare elegant text focuses on particular traits of these unusual sea creatures, creating an awareness of the diversity of life abounding in the ocean. 3+ KA



The Sea Monster Chris Wormell Jonathan Cape 2005 Hb ISBN 0224070258

The sea monster lives in the gloom of the ocean but sometimes crawls out and sits among the rocks on a lonely beach. An old fisherman lives in a cottage on a cliff above the beach. One day a boy comes, with his dog and toy yacht, to the beach to play in the rock pools. A magical story of a sea rescue is woven around these three characters. 3+ KA

When the turtles hatch and head for the sea, the smallest turtle is left behind. He takes a very circuitous route, but all the time the 'to the sea – to the sea' rhythmic refrain spurs him on. Expressive language – 'waves crashing and hissing', 'down the scorching sand he scrabbled and skittered' and delightful illustrations make a great sea story for 4 - 7 years old. CA



There's a Sea in my Bedroom Margaret Wild III. Jane Tanner Picture Puffin 1984

David is scared of the big, monstrous sea but loves the shells on the beach. He takes a conch shell home and enjoys the soft, gentle sound, but feels sorry for it trapped inside, so decides to let it out. David's room transforms into an ocean paradise where he isn't frightened at all. Jane Tanner's illustrations beautifully capture the small child's vibrantly coloured world. 4-8 years. CB

Jim and his dad love taking the 'Sally May', their old fishing boat out for a sail even though there are no longer fish to catch. But when the boat needs new sails and there is no money, the 'Sally May' joins the other fishing boats lined up on the shore. Then, Jim rescues a stranded dolphin, beginning a friendship that revives the economic fortune of his fishing village. 4+ KA

Little albatross is now big enough to be left in the nest while both parent birds fly off to hunt fish. Nearby, a predatory bird slowly moves in for the kill. And now out at sea the albatross become entangled in a fishing trawler's net. Will his parents be able to return in time to save little albatross? Michael Morpurgo highlights some of the hazards both natural and manmade that threaten the survival of our wildlife in this appealing story. For 4+. KA

The Selkie and the Fisherman Chardi Christian III. Freya Blackwood Hachette Children's Books Australia 2005 Hb ISBN 0733617336



Quick thinking Jess thinks of a way to ensure their freedom that also pleases the pirate. In a period of increasing inter-group tension between Pakeha settlers and Maori, Honatana and David build an enduring friendship like those of their Biblical namesakes, David and Jonathan, A New Zealand classic for ages 8+. They meet the paua poachers again in the second book and the poachers seem determined that the children will change their minds about what they saw and embark on a campaign of intimidation to ensure that they do. The Whale Rider tells the story of Kahu, descended from Kahutia Te Rangi, known as the whale rider



because of his legendary journey with a whale from Hawaiki to the East Coast of New Zealand, Kahu is the first of her generation in the whanua but her great grandfather rejects her as she is a girl and therefore not continuing the spiritual tradition carried by the male line of the whanau. Kahu however is spirited and courageous, often achieving better than her male peers in the feats associated with her tribe. When a herd of whales becomes stranded, it is Kahu whose determination and commitment to her people gives her the strength to ride the bull whale back into the sea. This is a wonderful moving story of family love, which explores the tensions that can arise between generations. It provides insights into the beliefs, traditions and community life of Maori, Although more suited to young adult readers, younger readers who have seen the film would find new understandings in reading the story, and children from seven or eight upwards would be entranced in hearing The Whale Rider as a read aloud. Based on true events, this book tells the





The Astrolabe is the name of one of two French ships which disappear somewhere in the Pacific Ocean in 1788 and the book begins with the disappearance of this ship and continues with a rather graphic description of the execution of Louis XVI. The story continues in 1826

when a second ship of the same name sets off to find out what happened to the first Astrolabe. Ten year old Lucien tells the story of 3 years of harsh conditions at sea and dangerous adventures on land culminating in his safe return to France. A gripping story for Intermediate age or older. HB

Molly's feeling pretty vulnerable; her mother has remarried and the reconstituted family has moved from safe England to America. Nicholas Young was 11 when he stowed away on the Endeavour in 1768. In diary/ship's log format Nick tells of their three-year circumference of the globe, including explorations of New Zealand and Australia. Sadly, the crew battle scurvy for most of the trip only to pick up typhoid and malaria in Batavia on the way home. Recommended for intermediate and up. LO

Sophie (13) and her cousin Cody record their trans-Atlantic crossing aboard the Wanderer, a 45-foot sailboat. They are enroute to visit their grandfather in England. Offers vivid descriptions of life on an ocean-going yacht, including storms and a devastating rogue wave. Best for early teenagers. LO

Most people know something about the mutiny on the Bounty without knowing exactly why and when this occurred. Ken Catran tells the story from the point of view of teenager John Hallett, one of the survivors from the crew set adrift and left to die by the mutineers. The story of their ordeal at sea is interspersed with flashbacks to their life on Tahiti and the strong attachments of many of the crew with Tahitian women. That they didn't all die was due to the strength, fortitude and harsh discipline of Captain Bligh who lived to command another ship although some of his men were not so fortunate. The hardships endured by these men and the deaths of some of them make absorbing but perhaps disturbing reading. 14+ HB
