The Lighthouse Keeper's Lunch Ronda and David Armitage Scholastic 1995 (first published Deutsch 1977) ISBN 0590551752




Cloudy With a Chance of Meatballs Judi Barrett, ill. Ron Barrett Aladdin 1982 ISBN 0689707495







Carle's take on the invention of the pretzel is an entertaining story about Walter, the most popular baker in his town. Walter makes the best and sweetest rolls in the whole Duchy, until one day there is a



mishap with spilt milk and he is forced to substitute water. This upsets the refined tastes of the Duke and Duchess, causing the Duke to enforce a harsh ultimatum – Walter must make a roll that the sun can shine through three times or he will be banished from the Duchy forever. Walter tries his hardest to do just that. 4 years+. KA

Alvie Eats Soup Ross Collins Arthur A. Levine Books 2002 Hb ISBN 0439272602 Alvie only eats soup, which is a big problem when his granny, a worldfamous chef, comes to visit. No matter



what his parents try, it's soup for Alvie but they're all surprised by what Granny eats! The illustrations are bright, and the dialogue is in speech bubbles. 3 years+. AC Pumpkin Soup Helen Cooper Picture Corgi 1999 ISBN 0552545104 This Kate Greenaway Medal winner is a delicious story of culinary



camaraderie. Cat, Squirrel and Duck live together in an old white cabin deep in the woods. They each have their own job to do in making their evening pumpkin soup and playing their night-time music and then they all snuggle in under the quilt they made together. When Duck decides to try out someone else's job for size, will this be the end of a beautiful friendship? Highly recommended for 4 years+. SB

Captain Edwina Bear and Patrick Duck are searching for pudding but it seems that the pudding pirates have stolen all the puddings in the Story universe and hidden them on Party Island. Just as they fight their way to the island they are recalled to the other world by the screams of a child who will not have his bath without his duck. 4 years+. HB

#### Mr Wolf's Pancakes

Mr Wolf wants to make some delicious pancakes but wolves don't read, count or write very well so he asks his neighbours for help, but they won't. So Mr Wolf does it all, all by himself – slowly. When the delicious smell of the pancakes drifts out, all of Mr Wolf's neighbours want to help him eat them. Mr Wolf is always polite – so he invites them in... A fun read with a great twist. 3 years+. AC



This book has very few words, but is good for lateral thinking, story starters, or just plain honest enjoyment. For all ages. LH

Loose colourful illustrations depict an ordinary family made up of the mother, two children and a dog. There are several in the series celebrating everyday life. The neighbours come through the hedge to have a tea-party in the back garden with lots of home-made treats. Things become more chaotic when the rain falls and they have to retreat inside. Delightful, friendly family fun. For 1 to 6 year-olds. CB



A delicious treasure - a very simple picture book with limited text and loose watercolour illustrations depicting a generous bodied, flowing bear delighting in his delicious fruit - the shape and colour of the fruit echoed in his body, the pear-shaped credits and the endpapers. Perfect to share with baby to 4 year olds. CB Eat Your Peas Kes Gray, ill. Nick Sharratt Random House 2001 ISBN 0099404672 It's dinner time and Daisy has to

face the *little green balls that were* ganging up on her plate. Daisy doesn't like peas so her mother tries bribes, which get more and more outrageous. As Daisy gets



more adamant, the illustrations zoom in on her face so that it fills more and more of the page until it takes up the whole page. A great read aloud for 3 years+. AC



That's when the fun starts as Biscuit Bear makes some friends, starts a circus, and escapes from Bongo the Dog. Biscuit Bear then goes searching for somewhere that is safe for a biscuit. Grey's illustrations and text perfectly convey the chaos of having a toddler in the kitchen – and a biscuit bear, and a biscuiteating dog. 3 years+. AC

#### Bread and Jam for Frances

(Available in many editions) ISBN 0060223596 Frances the little badger has been a favourite with parents and children for many years. In this book Frances decides she will eat nothing but bread and jam but when her parents decide to play along, and serve up bread and jam meal after meal, she soon decides that



she will eat what everyone else is eating. A great read aloud for 4+ years. HB

#### Desert Dessert

The animals in the desert are bored with plain old water from the waterhole to drink. They each take it in turns to add a new ingredient which they purchase from the conveniently located shop! They create a delicious desert dessert. Delightful use of language makes for a wonderful read aloud: *fluffy puffy whipped cream, wibbly wobbly jungle jelly.* For ages 3 and over, and I have used it very successfully with classes up to Year 6 because of the fun use of language, rhythm and alliteration. Sophie's house, but not content with what is being offered, he eats all the food and drinks all the water in the house. This is an

old favourite from the author/ illustrator of the Mog books. 3 years+. HB

A delightful story that will appeal to 3 years+. KA

Great fun for able readers or to read to ages 4+. HB

the lawn? That's not our baby's supper! YUCK! Thus begins this fun introduction to the food of different animals. It also shows that taste is a matter of opinion – as all the other baby animals think our baby's supper of milk is yuck! Great fun to read aloud to 2+ years (with strong stomachs). AC


#### In the Night Kitchen



The story ends happily with the baby's mother making pancakes for everyone. The repetitive text makes this a great read aloud for ages 3+. HB






day, Zoe goes off to work, while Henry and Balthus go out to buy some groceries, see the sights and make some friends; with riotous results! For ages 5 to 8. SB






