


Granny McFlitter the Champion Knitter

This charming picture book was the winner of the 2018 Storylines Gavin Bishop Awards and a finalist for the New Zealand Book Awards for Children and Young Adults. It follows the adventures of Granny McFlitter and her knitting obsession. Written in flawless rhyme with quirky scene depictions, the story opens with Granny's family who have

tired of her hobby. "But did Granny stop knitting? Oh no she did not, she went right on knitting ... like it or not!" When penguins get caught in the *Rena*'s oil spill, thank goodness for Granny's determination. She and her nifty needles have a woolly solution!

If you want to start at the beginning (because you are never too young for books) try the Reo Pēpi bilingual books for whānau sets. They are hard-wearing board books which introduce not just the words but some of the sentence structures in a very simple way.

Puffin the Architect by Kimberly Andrews Penguin Random House

An ingenious picture book that combines storytelling and endearing animal characters with excursions into architecture, engineering and storage solutions. We will hear more about this talented writer/illustrator, trained in biology and geology, who has made her name as an illustrator in the UK and now lives near Wellington.

Jurassic World: From DNA to Indominus Rex! by Caroline Rowlands Carlton Books

An augmented reality book which provides information about dinosaurs from the Jurassic World movie and allows the dinosaurs to "come to life" on your mobile device screen. Interactive software for this book (iCarltonAR) is available free as a separate download from the iTunes

store or Google play. With this book you make the dinosaurs "come to life" and walk around the room. You can take interactive photos with the dinosaurs and your child. **Ages 5+**



Cicada by Shaun Tann Lothian

Tan's remarkable title *Cicada* demonstrates the power of the picture book to convey big themes and complex emotional layers. The ill treatment of migrant workers, bullying, poverty and despair are explored through a hard-working insect office worker whose 17-year loyalty to the company goes unrewarded. When he is no longer


required, how will he survive in an indifferent world? All ages

all working on a very familiar building. Available in hardback, paperback and board book. **Ages 2+**




The Anzac Violin

"When you are far from home, music is a real connection to what you have left behind." Alexander Aiken, Dux of Otago Boy's High School, was given an unwanted violin in 1915 as he travelled on board a troopship from Dunedin to join the Great War in Europe.

The violin, which he eventually donated to his school, has his written record of the places he passed through. Jennifer and Robyn have meticulously recorded the war experiences of this remarkably gifted young man, and included a selection of research material displayed on the endpapers. This picture book format pays tribute to the courage of these soldiers.






Hairy Maclary and Zachary Quack by Lynley Dodd Penguin Random House

Do Not Wash This Bear by Sam Hay Egmont Publishers

In this hilarious, rhythmic picture book Daddy ignores a washing label and Bear comes alive! Bear has a very clear label sewn under his bottom. It says, "Do not wash this bear!" But when Daddy puts him through a spin cycle anyway, a very naughty Bear comes out — one

who causes mischief and mayhem all around the house! Father and son need Mummy to come home and save the day.

Bears Don't eat Egg Sandwiches by Julie Fulton Maverick Arts Publishing

Jack's visitor, a bear, arrives for lunch and he does not want any of Jack's egg sandwiches. So, what do you give a bear for lunch? Jack just escapes being the lunch! The lyrical repetition throughout will have kids squealing in anticipation of the title line, which is the bear's

response each time Jack politely and patiently offers egg sandwiches. The suspense builds

throughout, but all turns out well after Jack's clever solution, followed by a cute punchline. Bright and cheerful illustrations are a great match for this fun story.

The Longest Breakfast
by Jenny Bornholdt, illustrated by Sarah Wilkins

In this delightful picturebook a baby wakes his father with the word Toot. Dad decides breakfast should come before anything else and has to cope with a large number of unexpected guests all with different ideas on what is good for breakfast. In the end
